FROM PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY TO ECONOMIC AND SERVICE DELIVERY EMERGENCY

Gauteng Premier David Makhura says the provincial government will now put a special focus on tackling unemployment through economic recovery and reconstruction.

Makhura said it was all hands-on deck as government moves from the public health emergency to the economic and service delivery emergency.

"After so much death and destruction of lives and livelihoods, it is time to rebuild and do so with the greatest sense of urgency, single-mindedness and coordination demonstrated during our emergency response to COVID-19."

Addressing lawmakers during the State of the Province Address, Premier Makhura said the province would work

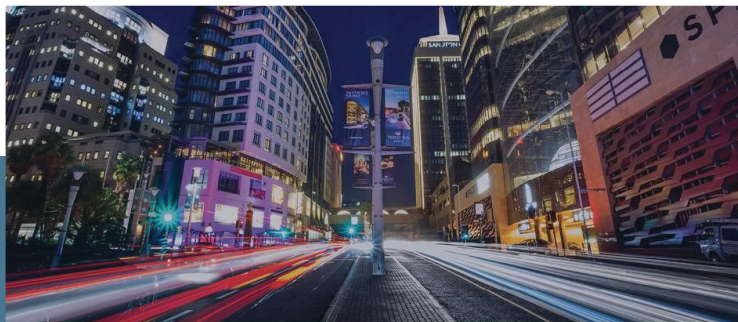
closely with municipalities. The province will work with all sectors of the economy in the war room to make the economy and jobs the number one priority over the next two years.

"We have learnt many lessons in our battle with the COVID-19 pandemic. These lessons include mobilisation of social compacting, promptly and decisively acting against crime and corruption in government

and society as well as inter-departmental and inter-governmental cooperation to avoid government working in silos."

This he said, will be done by working closely with municipalities and the national government to urgently accelerate service delivery and improve access to housing, electricity, water, sanitation,

The Premier said the Provincial War Room in which government and industry leaders have joined forces to drive economic recovery, unlock growth in every sector and create sustainable jobs as well to support SMME development.

"Through the war room, we are working with the captains of industry on programmes that will unleash growth by matching public policy support and government action with consolidated commitments by sector leaders on investments and jobs."

Makhura said special focus will be on creating jobs and economic opportunities for the people of Gauteng, especially the youth and women.

Key to this strategy is the Cannabis industry.

The province has been interacting extensively with the Cannabis Industry role players and have identified the unique economic opportunities of the industry in Gauteng.

"This year we will establish a dedicated unit within the provincial government to work with the industry and national government to address regulatory and licensing issues, attract investment, and facilitate black participation in this new sector that has enormous medicinal and industrial potential.

"We will give further feedback on the work being done in other sectors, such as the creative and cultural industries, freight and logistics, finance, and construction and infrastructure once this work is concluded by the relevant MECs and industry leaders and is ready to be turned into sectoral and localised social compacts."

He said the province was working on opening up value chains, building

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competitive local content production, promoting commercially meaningful enterprises, supplier development, SMMEs and township enterprises.

"The war room has now initiated a programme of quarterly sector action labs with industry representatives focusing on problem-solving and social compacting platforms.

"In partnership with the Public-Private Growth Initiative (PPGI), we will work with businesses, organised labour, SOEs and relevant national government department to re-ignite the Gauteng economy," highlighted the Premier.

The Premier said the war room has also provided work in the ICT and digital services sector.

This work draws in experts, policymakers, and businesspeople from across the digital economy landscape to support the implementation of the Gauteng Fourth Industrial Revolution (4IR) strategy.

Gauteng's Ekasi Labs, Township Cloud Zones and Hot-Desking Hubs will be optimal sites for new data centres and big investments in communication technologies.

The provincial government has also partnered with the University of

Johannesburg (UJ) to turn the province's mounting e-Waste (disposal of electrical appliances and electronic devices) problem into an economic opportunity and protect the environment.

"Through this partnership, the youth will be inspired and trained to recycle and create something meaningful from discarded devices and appliances," he added.

On aviation, the province working together with the Aviation Industry and the Tourism and Hospitality sector, is building a Gauteng Air Access partnership to attract more passenger and cargo airlines to operate from OR Tambo International and Lanseria Airports.

In the food, beverage, agro-processing and agribusiness sectors, the province is working with industry players and organised farmers in partnership with the Agricultural Development Agency to ensure food security and promote urban agriculture as a key sector for employment and business. ■

GAUTENG TAKES A HARD-LINE ON CORRUPTION

Conducting forensic investigations for alleged cases of corruption is meaningless if action is not taken by departments to resolve these allegations, says Premier David Makhura.

"We are driven by our responsibility to the people of our province. Citizens can only trust the call to fight corruption when they have evidence that some effort is made to not only investigate their complaints but to institute disciplinary action against the implicated officials," said Makhura in his State of the Province Address.

The provincial government has collaborated with various independent institutions such as the Special Investigation Unit (SIU); Public Service Commission (PSC); Public Protector, Auditor General and the Gauteng Ethics Advisory Council (GEAC). GEAC is a unique institution established by the Premier and led by civil society to help promote ethical leadership and integrity within government and in society.

These institutions are implementing the Gauteng City-Region Integrity Management Policy Framework - underpinned by the Gauteng Anti-Corruption Strategy founded on prevention, detection, investigation and resolution.

Cooperating with the PSC 70 allegations involving human resource irregularities, SCM irregularities, misconduct by officials, maladministration and fraud are being investigated.

Of these, 43 cases have been resolved and closed and 27 matters are still under investigation.

The Public Protector has been investigating 53 allegations related to the departments of Health (13), Education (11) and Co-operative Governance and Traditional Affairs (19). Of these 8 have been resolved and 45 are still under investigation.

Thus far, the provincial government has referred 14 matters to the SIU for investigation. Of these, 7 complaints are from the Gauteng Provincial Government, 4 matters are on flagship projects, and 3 additional complaints were submitted by whistle-blowers directly to the SIU.

Makhura said government is determined to take appropriate actions based on the outcomes of the investigations to bring credibility to the anti-corruption process.

Last week, the provincial government suspended nine officials over the R588-million renovation at the Ashanti Gold Hospital, on the recommendation of the Special Investigative Unit.

"Consequence management is a key component of improving the culture of the organisation and ensuring that there are no cases of unethical behaviour.

"Our management team comprises disciplinary action, improvement of internal controls, civil recovery and criminal prosecution."

The Premier said all members of the Executive Council are in the final phase

of the State Security Agency lifestyle audits.

Makhura said the Gauteng is the first to have undergone a lifestyle audit using the new framework developed by President Cyril Ramaphosa in line with the commitment he made in his first SONA.

Between 2014 and 2019, Gauteng made the greatest progress on audit outcomes, managing to achieve 65% clean audits and 100% unqualified audits in two successive years.

Audit outcomes, Makhura added, is yet another yardstick for accountable, transparent and improved governance. But they are also good for another reason. With each passing year, we can refer to see whether cumulatively we are making progress or not."

To prevent and combat endemic corruption practices within the tendering processes, the Gauteng Provincial Government championed procurement reform by introducing an Open Tender System.

There were further reforms such as the fraud detection reviews for all tenders above R10 million; the signing of an integrity pact with all service providers who do business with the government; and the introduction of an e-procurement system.

INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS TO BE DELIVERED ON TIME, AT COST

Over the next two years, Gauteng government will prioritise completing unfinished infrastructure projects and implement new ones to contribute significantly to job creation and government's overall economic recovery plan.

"Our determination to build the economy and infrastructure will be the central and driving tenet of this sixth administration.

"The focus will entail the completion of incomplete projects and the acceleration of the completion of new infrastructure projects across all regions," said Makhura during his State of the Province Address (SOPA) on Monday.

The delivery of infrastructure will be coordinated in a war room approach which will bring critical role players to deal with efficiencies, delivery and create partnerships.

"We will ensure that departments take full responsibility for the maintenance. All our infrastructure projects must be delivered on time and at cost," vowed Makhura.

He said should any of the implementing agents fail to deliver on time and on budget, he would not hesitate to replace them with agencies that would deliver on time and on budget.

He said the collapse of infrastructure for basic services also requires an emergency response akin to the way the province dealt with the COVID-19 public health emergency.

The construction of the Tshwane Automotive Special Economic Zone (SEZ) amid the COVID-19 pandemic demonstrates the kind of emergency response required to deal with the economic challenges.

Currently, there are 12 component manufacturers which are already operating in the Tshwane SEZ while construction work is continuing.

A total of 3440 permanent jobs have been created, exceeding the target of 3288 jobs.

Close to R1 billion has already been spent through the construction phase on SMMEs from Mamelodi township using the local contractor development system



nationally.

"It's all systems go and we will soon witness the manufacturing of the first new Ford Ranger at the Tshwane Automotive SEZ," said Makhura.

The provincial government is currently working with the Presidency and has established the project management office for the Lanseria Smart City development.

The office is driving the implementation of the master plan by focusing on; securing sufficient land and the acceleration of bulk infrastructure investment which will unlock R85 billion worth of private sector investment.

Once completed, Makhura said Lanseria will be a hub of the digital technology and services corridor, anchored by the new Hi-Tech SEZ in Lanseria.

Work is also underway for the Global Business Services SEZ at Nasrec, which will feature a plug and play global business services hub.

Between 2014 and 2019, the Gauteng government has invested R53 billion in social and economic infrastructure such as new houses, schools, clinics, hospitalisation, roads and streets, electricity, and water connection.

These have contributed to the creation of almost 120 000 jobs.

The premier committed to clear the title deeds backlog by 2024, by issuing 44 339 new title deeds to beneficiaries of current housing projects in the year ahead.

Over the past five years, the provision of Human settlements has benefited

more than 4 million people, in the 1.2 million public government-subsidised houses built across the province.

This year, government will prioritise the rapid land release programme as one of the critical interventions in addressing the housing backlog in the province.

"We are making progress in providing serviced stands that beneficiaries are using to build houses for themselves. In addition to the 1610 sites that we have allocated, we have also acquired an additional 12 000 stands to be allocated to beneficiaries," said Makhura.

Gauteng has introduced mega housing projects to address the ever-growing housing need and facilitate spatial transformation.

Mega housing projects are integrated mixed housing developments inclusive of social amenities, open spaces and economic opportunities.

The construction of mega housing projects is underway in Dan Tloome in Carletonville and Elijah Barayi in the Westonaria, Riversand in Johannesburg, John Dube and Clayville in Ekurhuleni.

According to Makhura, the province will continue to roll the Gauteng Broadband Network infrastructure and the maintenance of the network to improve access to free internet connectivity.

Since last year, government has upgraded six-core network nodes, provided Wide Area Network (WAN) connectivity to 1 224 sites; Local Area Network (LAN) connectivity at 652 sites; enabled Voice Over Internet Protocol (VoIP) at 287 sites and provided 37 Wi-Fi breakout points. ■

UNITE AGAINST GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE, CRIME

Violence against women remains a pandemic in South Africa. However, the Gauteng provincial government continues to work tirelessly to fight the scourge against gender-based violence and femicide (GBVF).

The province is taking urgent and decisive steps to make the province much safer for all, especially for women and children.

"We have deployed Gender-Based Violence Brigades in all wards and 30 dedicated GBVF social workers were appointed. The Department of Community Safety has also roped in 610 safety volunteers participating as GBV Brigades," said Premier David Makhura on Monday.

Speaking during his 10th State of the Province Address (SOPA) at the Brixton Multipurpose Centre, Makhura said working with law enforcement agencies, the GBV Brigades were on the frontline in the fight against GBV, working in their wards visiting households and creating awareness on the impact thereof.

In addition, the Gauteng Provincial Government has established 39 Green Doors across the province to offer immediate assistance to victims of GBV.

The Green Doors provide victims with a safe place, counselling, advice on opening a case and taking action against their abusers, basic emotional support, basic care and a place to rest.

Since 2019, a total of 1 151 GBV and crime victims have accessed and received support in these shelters.

Makhura said the province has launched the Floor Management Programme within police stations to limit secondary victimisation and waiting times for those reporting GBVF crimes.

"As a result of our efforts, we have reached a total of 437 895 beneficiaries through a programme of no violence against women and children, including 16 Days of Activism."

The footprint has extended to institutions of higher learning, with a total number of 122 382 having been reached through the awareness programme.

In protecting children in schools, the premier said all new staff members are now subjected to vetting.

Turning to crime, Makhura said government has established the War Room on Fighting Crime as part of building safer communities.

"The war room on crime brings together all spheres of government, civil society, the private sector and critical stakeholders ensuring that we build a safer Gauteng."

A total of 5 355 patrollers and 221 Community Policing Forum (CPF) members were trained in partnership with the South African Police Service to rid the area of crime.

In the year ahead, Makhura said, 1000 new CPF members will be trained.

Operation O Kae Molao will be intensified and strengthened in collaboration with private law enforcement agencies through the Eyes & Ears Programme.

"We call upon the people of Gauteng to join hands with the government in the fight against crime," he said

Gauteng sets aside R420 million for top learners

The Gauteng Provincial Government has set aside R420 million to invest in the education of young people who did exceptionally well in the 2021 matric year.

The Gauteng City Region Academy (GCRA) bursary scheme established in 2009 is aimed at investing in the education of young people.

Thus far, R2.2 billion has been allocated to this scheme and 27 000 young people funded have graduated.

Premier David Makhura said despite being one of the areas severely affected by the COVID-19 pandemic, education has continued to record some remarkable achievements in Gauteng.

Gauteng matric results have moved from 79% to 84% in terms of throughput rate largely because the focus was put on township schools to make learning conditions conducive.

"In the 2021 matric results, Gauteng was the second-best performing province with an 82.8% pass rate, which was a slight drop of 1% from 2020," Makhura said on Monday speaking during the State of the Province Address (SOPA) at Brixton Multipurpose Centre in Johannesburg.

A total of 130 schools in the province achieved a 100% pass rate. Another 462 had a pass rate that was above 90% with four of the top 10 districts in the country being from Gauteng.

Makhura said the Gauteng Provincial Government (GPG) continues to invest in the modernisation and quality delivery of education to improve outcomes, especially in township schools.

"This decision to invest in the modernisation of our education system has proven fruitful over the last eight years. "This progress has been the result of incremental interventions, which included ICT, investment in infrastructure, inputs into teacher training and adequate provision of classroom resources," Said Makhura.

In the year ahead, the premier said government would continue to focus on Early Childhood Development (ECD), a critical stage for the cognitive development of a child.

"We are pleased to report that 2 467 ECD practitioners have achieved a qualification at NQF Level 6.

"We were also able to increase the percentage of public schools offering grade R to 95,1% in 2021. This is an increase of 24 new Grade R sites, from the 1 386 sites that offered grade R in 2020," said Makhura.

The provincial government has dedicated funding for the introduction of Coding and Robotics to meet the challenges of the Fourth Industrial Revolution (4IR) in Primary Schools.

"We have identified 33 primary schools Grades R to 3 and 90 Grade 7 schools to participate in the pilot Coding and Robotics Programme."

Furthermore, Makhura said GPG has expanded the post-matric bursary scheme, enhanced schools of specialisation and provided schools for children with special needs in townships.

Makhura pays **TRIBUTE TO HEALTHCARE WORKERS**

Premier David Makhura has thanked the healthcare workers and other frontline staff who put their health and their lives at risk to care for the ill and vulnerable during the COVID-19 pandemic



“We convey our heartfelt gratitude to our healthcare professionals in both the public and private sector, for the outstanding service to the people of our province during this most difficult time in the life of our democratic nation,” Makhura said on Monday.

The premier was delivering his State of the Province Address (SOPA) at the Brixton Multipurpose Centre in Johannesburg.

Despite the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic and the burden placed on the health system, Makhura said healthcare and frontline staff were able to ensure that the health system does not collapse and contributed to the delivery of high-quality healthcare.

Since 2020, the battle against the COVID-19 pandemic and containing the spread of coronavirus became the number one priority of government.

“As we meet here today, the COVID-19 pandemic is under control and the massive vaccination programme has broken the chain between infections, hospital admissions and death.”

Although many people continue to get infected with the coronavirus, Makhura said evidence shows that most of those who are vaccinated are more protected from progressing to severe disease or death.

“We know that armed with vaccines, masks, hand sanitisers, better ventilation, physical distancing, and vigilance, we are winning the battle. This pandemic is getting contained and

it could soon become only endemic.”

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, 32 hospitals were repurposed to address the shortfall of beds in the province.

Makhura said government has delivered 4265 functional beds, of which 1600 had been delivered as permanent additional capacity to the provincial health system.

“The investment in the fight against the COVID-19 pandemic prevented our health system from collapsing while providing an opportunity to bring about efficiency in the delivery of our public health care system.”

To vaccinate as many people as possible, the Gauteng government and social partners continue the vaccination drive targeting workplaces through the ‘Jabs on the Job’ campaign.

Many employers have partnered with government and are setting up vaccination sites at their business premises to ensure the economy returns to full activity.

The Gauteng government continues to expand the vaccination programme targeting school communities starting with areas with low vaccine uptake. Mobile vaccination teams have been allocated to schools across five districts in the province.

The programme caters for learners aged 12 years and older, their family members, school staff and community members that are not yet vaccinated.

As at 20 February 2022, over 8,6 million vaccines have been

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administered, with 5.3 million people receiving one dose of either Johnson & Johnson or Pfizer and 4.4 million people have been fully vaccinated in Gauteng.

Makhura said the province will now focus on tackling unemployment through economic recovery and reconstruction which have substantially been eroded by the pandemic.

“After so much death and destruction of lives and livelihoods, it is time to rebuild and do so with the greatest sense of urgency, single-mindedness and coordination demonstrated during our emergency response to COVID-19.” ■

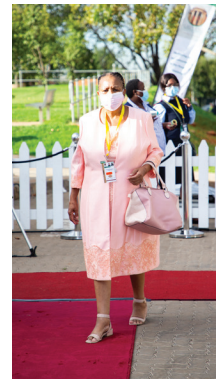

Premier Makhura delivered his tenth State of the Province Address at the Brixton Multipurpose Centre in Johannesburg on Monday, 21 February 2021.
