he Gauteng Premier, Panyaza Lesufi set the built and construction industry abuzz yesterday when he delivered the keynote address at the inaugural Re Aga Mmogo Gauteng Construction Expo, held at the Johannesburg Expo Centre. In an effort to foster economic highways and bridges in our Province empowerment and inclusivity, this groundbreaking event is specifically need new technologies and people designed to cater for Small Medium, with capabilities. We also need to Micro Enterprises (SMMEs) owned change our attitudes. Let the best by women youth and persons with tender be the best winner, not the one disabilities in construction and built sector.

Premier Lesufi said, "I stand Infront rising. We will change our cities, change our townships and demolish hostels. As the Gauteng Provincial Government (GPG) we believe that contractors to ensure that construction

the construction industry is the new economy that we are going to defend. The only question you need to answer is, 'Are you ready to move with us to the next level?. We are the generation that is ready to take Gauteng to the next level. We are ready to build and create more job opportunities. We with connections. We want to declare that as the Provincial Government we are ready to take Gauteng to the next level, because with you, we are of you today to say, Gauteng is capable to improve and innovate our townships and cities".

Premier Lesufi gave a stern warning to

projects finish on time to avoid being blacklisted by Government, "I want to urge SMMEs to finish the construction of projects that they have started within time and budget, to maintain their image as well as to open chances of growing their businesses. We cannot be associated with failure. We want to have our own banks to eliminate financial barriers, for those who need funding. When you leave this venue, I want you to say you are ready to move with us to the next level".

The Expo kicked-off in a plenary session, where industry leaders and GPG officials welcomed and engaged SMMEs on the state of affairs in the construction sector, issues affecting designated groups which included advancing transformation, inclusion and equality in the built industry as



well as unlocking the opportunities for the designated groups within the built industry. SMMEs who benefitted from Government programmes also shared their testimonies.

The MEC for the Department of Human Settlements and Infrastructure Development, Lebogang Maile encouraged SMMEs to collaborate and use this opportunity to receive information, "We want all the problems of SMMEs solved. Not for you to come here and listen to speeches and go home. This exhibition is not a talk shop. The main challenge is the dissemination of information. That is why we called you here today to come and receive information. Information is power. Do not leave without going to any of the stalls, we have people here who have benefitted, and others will share their success stories. Thank you all for coming through. Please network and find solutions to some of your problems. I hope this exhibition will add value." MEC Maile acknowledged challenges in the construction sector, adding that Government needs to do more for People living with Disabilities.

Amongst the speakers was the Office of the Premier's Director for Disability Rights, Zain Bulbulia who spoke about Universal Access and Design (UD&A) in the built and construction sector, "As a Province we want to see more universally designed buildings that are fully accessible to all our citizens. We have made an intervention as the Gauteng Provincial Government to ensure that no one is left behind.

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We are putting much emphasis on elevating opportunities for women, youth and persons with disabilities. We emphasise the contribution of private sectors to infusing inclusion and diversity in every project. The impact of this intervention will be unique. We invite all partners from private sector, organised labour, individuals at large to walk this journey with us. This collaborative initiative is a unique one, to bring all designated groups together. We are the only Province to have its policies on the designated groups. I am proud to say that GPG has achieved 2% on procurement for persons with disabilities, with 109 companies owned by persons with disabilities".

The Chairperson of the South African Women in Construction (SAWIC) and top-ranking woman in the construction industry, Clara Sikelelwa Sodlulashe-Mwenze encouraged women in the industry to stop complaining about what is not done for them but rather comply as compliance leads to success. She further warned that women should refrain from pulling each other down.

Another speaker was a young industry leader who serves as the Chief Transformation Officer for the Council for the Built Environment (CBE) Industry Expert, Thembakazi Moya, stated that to create opportunities for the targeted groups within the built industry, designated groups must be decisive and take action. She added that this can be accomplished through offering young people chances for networking, employment, training, and skill development, to be sustainable, they also need to improve collaboration between the public and



private sectors. Professional Project Manager and Senior Civil Engineer from the South African Institute of Civil Engineering (SAICE), Innocentia Mahlangu said, "In my profession, women make up just 10% of professionals. There are deeply rooted systemic barriers that we encounter in the industry such as societal prejudices and of course economic inequalities. These issues include limited access to The Re Aga Mmogo Expo is a finance, discrimination from finance dynamic platform, where more institutions, limited access to training, mentorship and market. Mpho Mapahtsoe

My company is focused on cleaning and facilities and it has been difficult as a woman to strive in this sector. We need mentorship and coaching. Women are mostly undermined. It is important that we receive support.

Samantha Masuku

Women are typically not seen in the construction industry. It is already a challenge to be taken seriously. However it gives me as a woman the drive to push harder and exceed expectations. I am looking forward to collaborating and engaging with other businesspeople in this sector.



Richman Ndindwa

For persons with disabilities, it has always been a challenge finding work in the construction industry. People see us and already conclude that we cannot do the job. There is also not enough information on how to go about in this industry for Persons living with Disabilities, and there is no drive to give us opportunities.

No one comes into construction industry with experience. Persons living with Disabilities are not given enough opportunities to advance in the industry. Government needs to host more of these Expos so that we can collaborate as SMMEs. We need to unlock all the opportunities for designated groups in the construction space. he exhibition component of the inaugural Re Aga Mmogo Gauteng Construction Expo 2024 got off to a very good start when the Gauteng Premier, Panyaza Lesufi flanked by the MEC for Human Settlements and Infrastructure Development, Lebogang Maile conducted a walk about and interacted with exhibitors.

With over 50 exhibitors in attendance, Hall 8 of the Nasrec Expo Centre, where the exhibition was held, was a hive of activity as delegates moved from stall to stall, interacting with exhibitors and gathering what many said was, "valuable information" from the different organisations.

The Re Aga Mmogo Gauteng Construction Expo 2024 truly lived up to expectation as the exhibition attracted over 2000 visitors and delegates from across the targeted groups (women, youth, Persons with Disability and military veterans) who are eager to become part of the construction industry and for those who already have a foot in door as budding and emerging SMMEs, but wish to grow and have more impact in the construction industry value chain.

Visitors were spoilt for choice and offered a wholistic informative package to qualify and empower them to do business with the Gauteng Provincial Government. Organisations invited to participate at the Exp were grouped in the following categories: Government Departments and Government Entities / Agencies; Funding Institutions; Sectorial Regulatory bodies and Nonprofit Organisations (NPOs) and private companies.

One of the highlights of the expo in Hall 8 was the inclusion of a popup stage complete with its own fully fledged programme where carefully





selected representatives from relevant institutions made brief presentations on their service offerings and fielded questions under the following thematic topics: Skills Development, Training and Mentoring; Funding Opportunities; Business Incubation; and Regulatory Compliance.

Dinaledi Nteleki from The South African Council for the Project and Construction Management Professions (SACPCMP) a regulatory body for project managers said their participation at the Expo is aimed at encouraging SMMEs to

professionalise their participation in the construction sector by taking up their candidate training and mentoring programme.

The Vice Chairperson and Director of South African Women in Plumbing and Trades (SAWIP), Kile Mteto asserted their role in advocating for women artisans within the sector and how SAWIP provides technical skills training in plumbing and further offers mentoring, trades test and business skills.



Mila Natasha Mgengwana of Stakeholder Management and Relations and Social Facilitation entity, highlighted the importance of social facilitation saying, "although focus in the built environment is on brick and mortar, it does not stop there, focusing on socialising the person or beneficiary and community is of equal importance."

It was clear by the pulpable exhilarating atmosphere at the exhibition that this was a culmination of hard work from the coordinating team behind the scene, and an overflowing passion of the various exhibitors about their service offering that fully aligned with the foresight of the provincial executive in calling for the, Re Aga Mmogo Gauteng Construction Expo 2024.

he Re Aga Mmogo Construction Expo has emerged as a beacon hope for capacitating and enhancing the skills of construction and built environment Small, Medium, and Micro Enterprises (SMMEs) owned by designated groups. These groups include businesses owned by women, youth, persons with disabilities and military veterans. Recognised as significant contributors to economic growth and job creation in the sector, these SMMEs experience challenges stemming from under-capacitation and financial disadvantages. However, through the various pop-up seminars conducted at the Expo, a transformative journey towards empowerment and inclusivity is well underway.

Participants attending the Re Aga Mmogo Construction Expo accessed a plethora of opportunities to successfully overcome barriers in the construction industry. Government, public sector agencies, businesses, funding institutions, institutions of higher learning and professional bodies, collaborated to facilitate these workshops.

The pop-up sessions provided a vital opportunity for participants to enhance their knowledge, keep abreast of regulations and acquire critical skills to obtain sustainable competitive Black Property Practitioners (SAIBPP) advantage.

The first session, chaired by Malusi Shezi, the CEO of the Construction Education and Training Authority (CETA), focused on Skills Development, Training and Mentorship Opportunities with contributions from Malusi Shezi and Jabu Seriti. The Chairperson of MV Development Agency, Nonkonzo Molai elaborated on programmes to promote economic participation for military Veterans. Dr Mahachi from UJ Engineering and Built Environment,






provided insight on innovative building technology and the future of construction. Zandile Nokwanda from the South African Institute of discussed training and mentorship opportunities within the property sector for designated groups.

Thandeka Molefe the Director of Thamleaf Construction Projects said, "this initiative by the Gauteng government infrastructure sector is highly appreciated as it is not easy for women to get into the construction industry and understand all that is needed. To have all these speakers' giving information under one venue, enabling us to enhance our knowledge

and access the funding and regulation industry in one day is amazing. I enjoyed the first session and I'm looking forward to rest."

The second session, chaired by Shiraaz Lorgat from Acting Chief Investment and Development Officer from Gauteng Partnership Fund, delved into funding opportunities. Solly Mabandla from the National Empowerment Fund discussed on funding opportunities for designated groups within the construction and property sectors. Dingaan Mahlangu from Standard Bank, elaborated on funding growth and expansion opportunities for women owned SMMEs. Dudu Phoswa from the Social Housing Regulatory Authority



(SHRA) spoke about opportunities for SMMEs in the social housing value chain. Next. the Chairperson of BRICS Women Alliance (BWA), Lebogang Zulu presented opportunities for construction SMMEs across the BRICS member states. The Chairperson, of the National Youth Development Agency (NYDA), Karabo Mohale discussed opportunities for youth SMMEs in construction. Nosipho Khenkela from Small Enterprise Funding Agency (SEFA), presented on Summary funding presentation outlining opportunities for construction SMMEs. The third pop-up session, focused on Business Incubation, aimed to nurture emerging enterprises. Chaired by key Lebogang Zulu, the Chairperson of BRICS Women Business Alliance (WBA).

The final pop-up session which centred on Regulatory Compliance was chaired by Dudu Phoswa a seasoned training and capacity building professional. Expert from the South African Revenue Service (SARS) presented on the Regulatory compliance for SMMEs to manage annual tax returns and tax certificates. Andiswa Ndlovu, elaborated on the CIDB Registration and grading for small and micro business owned by the designated groups. Mpho Phala from Phamakgo Distributors had this to say about the Expo, "The Expo is very informative because it gives one knowledge of where to go when you need assistance in construction industry or whatever



the Government have to offer interms of business, for people with disability, not only people with disabilities but also women and youth in construction. For me this Expo is very powerful and I'm grateful for what I've learnt today. I'm going to share the information with others especially those who were not here.
