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Let us join the call by President Ramaphosa, to go out and dance to the talent of our country produced by the creative and cultural industries. We know that the industry has been hard hit by the pandemic, we are confident that like all other sectors it will be revived including using the digital platforms that can take our cultural and creative industries sector to a global scale.
