Individual actions key to ending TB

As the country observe National Tuberculosis (TB) Awareness Month (March), the Gauteng Department of Health (GDoH) urges communities to access free TB screening services, adhere to TB treatment and complete the full course of treatment to reduce mortality and disease progression.

TB - a communicable disease caused by bacillus Mycobacterium tuberculosis, primarily spreads through the air when a TB infected person expel the bacteria into the air by coughing. While the disease mainly affects the lungs, it can also impact other parts. Adults, particularly men, are more susceptible to TB than females, with most of the common symptoms include persistent cough for more than 24 hours, weight loss, loss of appetite, night sweats, and lethargy.

To improve TB outcomes, the GDoH has intensified outreach programme focusing

on high-burden areas such as townships, informal settlements, and hostels (TISH) with the aim of providing essential services including extensive TB health education, mobile Chest X-ray screenings, patient tracing, and facilitating access to care.

Currently, there are 73 decentralised sites across the province, enabling patients to receive treatment closer to their homes, reducing the need for admission to Sizwe Tropical Disease Hospital.

In an effort to reduce TB-related deaths and ensure the successful treatment of all individuals diagnosed with Tuberculosis, the GDoH is partnering with civil society organisations, mines, traditional healers, business corporates, and government departments to raise awareness and

Target to equip communities with life-saving skills surpassed

The Gauteng Department of Health, through the Lebone College of Emergency Care (LCOEC), has managed to equip 3,203 community members with life-saving skills as first responders across all five health districts. This is above the target committed by MEC for Health and Wellness Nomantu Nkomo-Ralehoko, during the delivery of the departmental 2023/24 budget vote to capacitate 2,500 people with First Responder training.

The First Responder Training programme is an initiative of the Department intended to provide communities with knowledge and skills necessary to assist victims while awaiting emergency support from qualified responders and healthcare professionals.

MEC Nkomo-Ralehoko stated that the training empowers participants to effectively respond to common emergencies such as accidents, trauma incidents, medical emergencies, and cases of suicide, all while awaiting the arrival of professional emergency response teams.

The training program covered a wide range of scenarios, including assisting victims experiencing convulsions, managing critical wounds such as stab and gunshot wounds, providing aid to individuals who have fallen from heights, addressing sprains and strains, rescuing drowning victims, and treating burns. Participants were also taught how to perform CPR on individuals who have no pulse and are not breathing.

High-quality CPR when performed immediately can double or even triple survival from sudden cardiac arrest. Having more people equipped to provide high-quality CPR at any point along the chain of survival can help us improve survival rate.

As part of the Department's TISH (Township Informal Settlement and Hostel) outreach programme, the participants who took part in the training were mainly young unemployed people from various

disadvantaged communities from Ekurhuleni, Sedibeng, Johannesburg, West Rand and Tshwane districts.

One of the trainees, Tshepiso Maboe, expressed gratitude for acquiring life-saving skills through the training. He shared that he had previously encountered medical emergencies but lacked the knowledge to respond effectively. Now equipped with the necessary skills, he feels confident in his ability to handle emergency situations involving burnt wounds, bleeding, seizures, and fractures. Maboe believes that in future emergencies, he will be better prepared to provide emergency aid.

"The First Responder Training has given me the skills I need to attend to burnt wounds, bleeding, seizures, and fractures. I believe that next time when I am faced with an emergency, I will be in a better position to deal with it," said Maboe.

MEC Nkomo-Ralehoko said during the 2023/24 budget vote speech that the Department through its TISH programme will ensure that healthcare services reach every corner of the township especially those living in townships, informal settlements, and hostels. The First Responder Training programme seeks to bridge the knowledge gap in emergency care services by ensuring that in every street of the community there is a trained person to attend to provide aid when the need arises.



Confronting the 'silent thief of sight' through eyecare services to the elderly

In efforts to reduce Glaucoma in communities, the Johannesburg Health District Service's Eyecare and Geriatrics Department visited Joseph Gerard Home for the Aged in Alexandra, to raise awareness, conduct eye screening and provide reading glasses to the elderly residents. This was part of observing World Glaucoma Week (10 – 16 March) and World Glaucoma Day (12 March).

Glaucoma, often referred to as the "silent thief of sight," damages the optic nerve, which is responsible for transmitting the images we see to our brain. In a healthy eye, there is a clear liquid that circulates in the front portion, maintaining a healthy eye pressure. This liquid is continuously produced and drained in equal amounts.

However, in individuals with Glaucoma, the fluid does not flow properly through the drainage

system, leading to increased eye pressure. This increased pressure exerts additional force on the optic nerve, resulting in damage to the eye.

Glaucoma can result to irreversible vision loss if left undetected and untreated. According to Glaucoma Research Foundation, over 80 million people worldwide are affected. Glaucoma is a painless disease with its visual symptoms often appearing very late. Only half of those who are actually diagnosed with the condition have any symptoms at all.

Although Glaucoma affects people of all ages, ethnicities, and backgrounds, elderly individuals who are at the greatest risk for developing glaucoma, often attribute their loss of vision to just growing old. Vision loss from Glaucoma is silent, slow, progressive and irreversible, but it is treatable. However, glaucoma blindness is preventable through early detection and regular eye examinations.

Makhanya, a 63-year-old female resident at the home, expressed her gratitude for the visit by healthcare professionals. "I appreciate these visits a lot. As elderly individuals, we are not always aware of when to get our eyes checked. Such visits help us maintain healthy eyes, allowing us to continue reading, which is something I enjoy," she said.

The Gauteng Department of Health calls on communities to make their eye health a priority by scheduling regular visits to their nearest healthcare facilities for comprehensive eye examination. It is important to join hands with communities to educate loved ones especially those above the age of 40 as they are more at a risk of developing Glaucoma.

The TISH outreach initiative continues to change lives for the better

The Gauteng Department of Health’s outreach programme to take health services to township, informal settlements, and hostel (TISH) communities spearheaded by the MEC for Health and Wellness Nomantu Nkomo-Ralehoko continues to broaden access to healthcare services and impact lives especially for previously disadvantaged communities.

To date over 12 million people in Gauteng have been reached through campaigns rolled out as part of the TISH programme.

On Thursday, 14 March 2024, Mr Sipiwe Nhlapo, who has cerebral palsy, was one of the four patients from Khutsong near Carletonville in the West Rand who received assistive devices in the form of brand new and advanced battery-operated wheelchairs.

The wheelchairs provided are equipped with cushions to prevent pressure sores, and the cushions have waterproof covers to address any wetting accidents. These wheelchairs promote independence and meets the mobility needs of the patients.

he four recipients were identified through the TISH initiative driven by the Rehabilitation Services Unit in



the West Rand District Health Services which focuses on the Merafong Sub-District and aims to assist neurological patients by monitoring their condition and providing necessary support.

Nhlapo expressed his gratitude and joy, emphasising that the wheelchair would grant him the ability to do things for himself and be less dependent on other people for his basic needs.

The Rehabilitation Services Unit plays a crucial role in providing ongoing rehabilitation and primary healthcare services to patients. They closely monitor the patients’ conditions and ensure that their assistive devices are well-maintained and adjusted as needed, considering that patients’ body structures and cognitive states may change over time. The goal is to ensure that the devices continue to meet the patients’ evolving needs, promoting independence, safety, and security.

Ms. Nkateleng Dlamini, the head of the Rehabilitation Services Unit, explained that many patients are identified by the Ward Based Outreach Team (WBOT), which assists in locating and referring individuals for further treatment.

During the handover ceremony of the assistive devices, MEC Nkomo-Ralehoko, emphasised that every community member living with disabilities has the right to resources that enhance their quality of life.

At another TISH outreach to Sethokga hostel in Tembisa on Friday, 15 March where various health services were offered to the community, the MEC highlighted the benefits of early detection of health issues as this significantly enhances the chances of successful treatment or recovery.

The basket of services taken to the community included comprehensive health screenings, TB testing services, immunization (EPI), vitamin A supplementation, deworming, sexual reproductive services, adherence support for chronic treatment, healthy lifestyle tips, oral health services, pap smears, prostate-specific antigen (PSA) testing, youth-friendly services, and eyecare tests.

Communities were also encouraged to adopt an active lifestyle and participate in physical exercises as a proactive measure to minimize the risk of developing various illnesses.

Through the TISH outreach programme, Gauteng Department of Health aims to expand the services available at primary healthcare facilities, bringing them closer to the community for easier accessibility.

Call for public comments on proposed fees for ambulance, mortuary and hospital services

Interested, affected persons and stakeholders have until the 29th of March 2024 to submit written comments and representations on the draft regulations relating to the proposed increase in Uniform Patient Fee Schedule payable in the new financial year for ambulance, mortuary, and hospital services.

The fees/tariffs have since been reviewed by an upward adjustment of 4,9% for the 2024/25 financial year. This is in line with the nationally determined increase which is applicable in all provinces. It represents a minimal increase and in some instances the fees remain the same.

The new tariffs will only come into effect once all inputs have been factored in and approval has been given by the Gauteng Provincial Legislature.

The revised fees will be applicable to all categories of patients, medical schemes, Road Accident Fund, Workman’s Compensation, intergovernmental organs



such as the South African Police Service (SAPS), non-subsidised categories of foreign nationals treated at State Health Facilities and differentiated amenities and all subsidised patients within the following categories except for those categories that are exempted or qualify for free services:

- H1 – individuals with an income of less than R70 000 per annum and households with an income less than R100 000 per annum.
- H2 – Individuals with an income less than R250 000 per annum and households with an income less than R350 000 per annum.
- H3 – Individuals with an income greater than or equals to R250 000 per annum and household with an income greater than or equals to R350 000 per annum.

In terms of the revised fees, an individual under H1 category who calls an ambulance requiring advanced life support will be charged R160.00 which is R5 more

than what they are currently paying. The same H1 category patient who accesses services at a provincial hospital and consults a specialist practitioner will be charged R95 per visit compared to R90 currently.

The Uniform Patient Fee Schedule billing system ensures a simplified charging mechanism for public hospitals, hospital mortuaries and ambulance services, and it provides a transparent and consistent fee structure for the treatment of patients, both as in-patients and out-patients. This adjustment is in line with the annual review process and takes into account the cost-of-living adjustments and the inflation rate.

xIn addition, the annual review of the fees/tariffs is conducted in accordance with the requirements of Treasury Regulations 7.3.1 and the Public Finance Management Act No.1 of 1999. These regulations mandate the accounting officer of an institution to review all fees, charges, rates, scales, or tariffs that are not fixed by law and relate to revenue accruing to a revenue fund.

Plans afoot to address the toxicology and histology backlogs

The Gauteng Department of Health (GDoH) has given an assurance to the public that the reduction of the toxicology and histology cases backlogs within the Gauteng Forensic Pathology Service remains a priority.

The province is currently tackling over 17 000 toxicology cases and over 7000 histology cases with some dating as far as 2007. Although this is a nation-wide challenge, the GDoH has committed to put measures in place to fast-track the addressing of the backlogs.

Toxicology reports give an indication of the type and approximate amount of legal and illegal drugs that are in the deceased’s body by measuring how much of the substances is in their blood, urine, or other bodily fluid. Histopathology on the other had focuses on the diagnosis and study of diseases of the tissues and involves examining tissues and/or cells under a microscope.

The backlogs can be attributed to a combination of factors, including the emergence of foreign drugs that are difficult to trace, an increase in cases involving sudden deaths, suspicion of poisoning among family members in case of unexpected death, the absence of medical histories for certain deceased individuals (this leads to prolonged multiple tests one body), and

the limited availability of private laboratories willing to conduct state toxicology tests and appear as expert witnesses in court.

“We are fully aware of the impact the backlogs have on the families of the deceased, who are seeking closure and facing material trauma due to long delays in finalising estates.

We also understand that insurance claims are being affected and interventions are being made to resolve this issue,” explains the acting Chief Executive Officer of the Gauteng Forensic Pathology Service, Mr Thembaletu Mpahlaza.

In an effort to find a lasting solution in addressing the toxicology and histology backlogs, the GDoH will continue to engage external private partners through the public-private partnerships to augment the current capacity to process cases.

The Department has furthermore embarked on a drive to recruit specialist toxicologists to boost capacity of the existing team and enhance the ability to process cases more expeditiously.

The opening of the Garankuwa Forensic Pathology Service Training Room which will contribute towards producing highly skilled people in the field of forensic pathology will lead to the development of histopathologist.

In the first quarter of the new financial year the long-awaited state-of-the-art Forensic Medical Service facility at Helen Joseph Hospital will open its doors. The structure will make provision for an in-house toxicology laboratory among other laboratories. This will be a major game changer in dealing with the historic backlogs.
