Efforts to eradicate youth unemployment intensified in Gauteng

The Gauteng government has this Youth Month taken a stance against unemployment by advertising all funded vacant positions across all provincial departments and agencies.

Thousands of young people and job seekers of all ages on June 16 flocked to sites that were set up as part of the launch of the Nasi iSpani Job Fair. Twenty-two walk-in application centres were open on the day to allow qualifying people to apply for employment opportunities. The jobs included entry-level positions that do not require experience to mid and senior-level management roles.

Members of the Executive Council were deployed across various sites to monitor and ensure smooth operations on the day. MEC for Health and Wellness, Nomantu Nkomo-Ralehoko who visited sites in Ekurhuleni said that the job fair is one of the many efforts by the Gauteng government to tackle unemployment in the province, particularly amongst the youth. facing the youth today. "We came here in the wee hours of the morning as we did not want these golden opportunities to pass us. Even though the queues were too long, the officials managed to assist everyone who needed assistance and it didn't take that long as we had anticipated," said Mhlongo.

The Nasi iSpani initiative is about more than just addressing unemployment. It is about strengthening government's capacity, which, in turn, will result in improved service delivery for Gauteng residents.

Thirty-eight-year-old Phumzile Kabane, a hopeful job seeker said that she is grateful that the provincial government has embarked on this massive recruitment drive which follows many employment opportunities which have been consistently shared with Gauteng residents in the previous months.

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"I beat cancer, so can you" – urges cancer survivor

Cancer survivors gathered this past week at Charlotte Maxeke Johannesburg Academic Hospital (CMJAH) to raise awareness and encourage those battling the deadly disease to soldier on.

Many people who get diagnosed with cancer lose hope as they believe that it is the end of the road for them. However, early detection and management of any cancer is vital for treatment and chances of achieving cure.

Jeanette Nkabinde who got diagnosed with breast cancer in 2013 and received treatment at CMJAH has expressed gratitude for the oncology treatment received at the hospital which has saved her life. Due to the advancement of her cancer, she unfortunately had to do a mastectomy.

Nkabinde said that the availability of cancer treatment in the public healthcare system is the one thing that gave her hope and assured her that she will emerge victorious after her ordeal.

"When I was referred to Charlotte to do chemotherapy and radiation, I had so many challenges including support from those around me, expect for my family. The staff at this hospital gave us all the support we needed and I want to encourage all cancer patients that they can beat this disease as they are not in this journey alone," said Nkabinde.

Nkabinde is one of many cancer survivor who was diagnosed and treated at public



health facilities and is well to tell the story to encourage others who remain in despair, that the end of the road has not yet arrived.

Breast cancer most commonly presents as a painless lump or thickening in the breast. It is important that women finding an abnormal lump in the breast consult a health practitioner without a delay of more than 1-2 months even when there is no pain associated with it.

General symptoms of breast cancer include a breast lump or thickening, alteration in size, shape or appearance of a breast, dimpling, redness, pitting or other alteration in the skin, change in nipple appearance or alteration in the skin surrounding the nipple and abnormal nipple discharge.

Nonhlanhla Khumalo, who reiterated to cancer patients at CMJAH that the disease is not a death sentence said that after undergoing treatment and achieving cure, she was able to advance her studies which resulted in promotions at work.

"I am now able live my life as I had envisioned. Immediately after achieving cure, I went back to school to do my matric, then followed with a qualification in public management. Even though I lost my breast, cancer did not destroy me, it made me a champion as I am now an advocate for the treatment of the disease," said Khumalo.

As a cancer ambassador at CMJAH, Khumalo gets to participate in raising awareness on breast cancer during the Pink ODI, a massive drive to raise funds for patients suffering the disease by Cricket South Africa.

In addition, Khumalo and other cancer survivors encouraged other patients at CMJAH to modify or avoid key risk factors and implement existing evidence-based prevention strategies.

Avoiding tobacco, maintaining a healthy weight, eating a healthy diet with plenty of fruit and vegetables, exercise, limiting alcohol, practicing safe sex and getting vaccinated against hepatitis B and human papillomavirus are some of the cancer prevention strategies.

It is important that if people suspect that they have cancer symptoms they go to their nearest healthcare centre for assessment. Women can do breast self-examinations every month, 5 -7 days after their menstrual periods. Possible indications of breast cancer include swelling, lumps, discharge or any changes in the breast.

Thelle Mogoerane Hospital unveils monument to honor namesake

Thelle Mogoerane Regional Hospital recently celebrated Thelle Mogoerane's 40th anniversary to honor the stalwart who was dedicated and committed to the pursuit of justice and equality, a hero whom the hospital is named after.

To preserve Mogoerane's name, the hospital in partnership with VUKA, a liberation heritage and cultural research foundation, has dedicated a garden at the hospital's entrance with a plaque detailing the hero's key milestones and the events leading to his death. The plaque is an attempt to educate visitors to the facility about who Mogoerane was.

Ekurhuleni Health District Chief Director Terrence Magoro delivered the keynote speech on behalf of MEC Nomantu Nkomo-Ralehoko and said that the hospital bearing his Mogoerane's name is bound to his legacy and values. The hospital is a sentinel, guarding what he held sacred: compassion, service, and the absolute right to dignity and healthcare for all.

"This hospital is tasked with immense responsibility. As the custodian of his legacy, it is incumbent upon the Thelle Mogoerane hospital to embody the principles that defined his existence. Each healthcare practitioner within these hallowed halls should carry the mantle of his spirit, with the nobility of purpose that resonates with Thelle Mogoerane's indomitable will," explained Magoro.


