

Gauteng intensifies measles immunisation campaign to curb outbreak

The Gauteng Department of Health (GDoH) has intensified the measles immunisation campaign as part of efforts to curb the increasing number of cases recorded in the province in recent weeks.

Since the outbreak was declared in the Limpopo province in September 2022, Gauteng has recorded a total of 27 confirmed measles cases as at 25 January 2022. The City of Ekurhuleni has recorded the majority of the infections with 17 confirmed cases, while Tshwane has five (5), three (3) in Johannesburg and two (2) in the West Rand, and none in Sedibeng.

MEC for Health and Wellness, Nomantu Nkomo-Ralehoko has been visiting schools across the province to provide support to school health teams in the Measles Outbreak Response Campaign.

"The rapid increase in the number of measles infection cases in the province is concerning, particularly in the City of Ekurhuleni. We encourage parents to come to the fore, sign and return consent forms to allow our nurses to administer routine immunisation and other health services to learners. Parents can also take thier little ones to their nearest clinic for immunisation," said MEC Nkomo-Ralehoko.

So far, Gauteng has administered the measles immunisation on 286 671 children and aims to reach a target of 4 004 720 through the campaign. The targeted population for the measles immunisation is children aged between six (6) months and 15 years. Some schools in the province, particularly those in townships and informal settlements have been struggling with parents who do not sign and return consent forms. This prevents school health nurses to provide immunisations to learners to protect against infectious diseases.

In addition, MEC Nkomo-Ralehoko said that the consent forms will also allow school health nurses to provide various health screenings to ensure that learners with conditions that can hinder learning are assisted.

"Through our Integrated School Health Programme (ISHP), learners are able to be provided with an array of services which include oral health, vision and hearing assessments and treatment, as well as mental health and psychosocial services," said the MEC Nkomo-Ralehoko.

Working with other Departments in the province, the ISHP also provides health education on hand washing, personal and environmental hygiene, nutrition and Tuberculosis, as well as road safety, poisoning and abuse (sexual, physical and emotional).







Covid-19 boosters provides the best defence against Kraken variant

Gauteng MEC for Health and Wellness, Nomantu Nkomo-Ralehoko has urged Gauteng residents to take up Covid-19 booster doses to protect against the recently discovered XBB.1.5 variant also nicknamed "Kraken".

The Kraken variant was first detected in October 2022 in the USA and has since been detected in several other countries with the first detection in South Africa from a sample collected late in December 2022.

MEC Nkomo-Ralehoko said that people are still getting very sick from the Covid-19 infection and it is important that all those who are yet to get their booster doses do so at any site near them.

"The vaccine has been proven to increase immunity and offers us the best protection against severe illness. We encourage the public to get their boosters, including people with chronic diseases and the elderly as they are most vulnerable to the virus."

"I have taken the Covid-19 vaccine and two booster doses already, and I have not experienced any extreme side effects. However, it is important for people to know that every medication has side-effects, it is written even on the packaging," said the MEC.

Covid-19 vaccines have been proven to be effective in preventing severe illness, hospitalisation and death. It can be taken by any person aged 12 and above, and it is also safe for pregnant women to get vaccinated at any stage of the pregnancy.

In addition, MEC Nkomo-Ralehoko reiterated that communities should continue incorporating simple hygiene practices, such as washing hands with soap, keeping windows open, wearing a mask in crowded spaces and staying at home when sick.

"Our community health workers are on the ground providing education on keeping healthy and how to access health services, including Covid-19 booster doses and other critical health screenings."

"Community members who need information regarding public vaccination sites can visit the Gauteng Department of Health social media pages," said MEC Nkomo-Ralehoko.

Keep cool and hydrated this summer to avoid heat related conditions

Gauteng residents are encouraged to drink enough water and wear a hat or cap and sunglasses to protect from the scorching heat blazing the province.

This comes after a warning by the South African Weather Service of hotter than average conditions that can cause heat related illnesses. Rapid rise in heat gain due to exposure the scorching sun can compromises the body's ability to regulate temperature.

People who are at risk of heat related conditions such as severe dehydration, exhaustion, heat cramps, heat stroke, hyperthermia and other stressors to the body include the elderly, infants and children, pregnant women, outdoor and manual workers and athletes.


It is also important for people with chronic conditions such as cardiac diseases and kidney disorders to take extra precautionary measures to protect themselves as they are more vulnerable extreme heat and should.



The World Health Organisation recommends that those taking medicines should keep them below 25 °C or in the refrigerator. However, it also important to read the storage instructions on the packaging.

In the past few weeks, seven deaths were recorded in the Nothern Cape due to Heatstroke, therefore, it is important for people with symptoms of higher body temperature of 40°C or higher, headache, rapid breathing and racing heart to seek immediate medical treatment.

For any medical emergency, community members are encouraged to contact the Gauteng Emergency Medical Services on 112 from their cellphones or 10177 from a landline. It is important to stay calm and provide an accurate address and nearest landmark, and keep phones on and close in case the paramedics call back.



MEC Nkomo-Ralehoko condemns the inhumane treatment of health workers

The Gauteng MEC for Health and Wellness, Nomantu Nkomo-Ralehoko has described as inhumane and vulgar the attack on health care workers at a municipal clinic in Tsakane, Ekurhuleni.

This comes after the MEC learned of a video that has been circulating on social media which shows an unhappy member of the public allegedly throwing urine at the staff at Calcot Dlephu Clinic who were on their lunch break. The incident happened on Friday, 20 January

"Irrespective of the complaint the member of the public might be having against the health workers, this cannot justify the attack on them. It is uncalled for and we condemn this vulgar act in the strongest possible terms," said MEC Nkomo-Ralehoko.

The MEC pointed out that resorting to violence and hurling of insults will ever be acceptable as there are recourse mechanisms such as escalating complaints and allegations to quality assurance people or the facility manager at the relevant service point.

Health care workers across the province have found themselves under attack from communities in recent times where some have even been robbed of their belongings and in other instances the attacks end up with patient care being severely hampered resulting in loss of life.

"I would like to appeal to communities to work with us to end the attack on healthcare workers. On our part we have made a commitment to ensure that we improve patient experience of care at healthcare facilities," said MEC Nkomo-Ralehoko indicating that she has directed the department to investigate the matter and establish the facts around the incident to determine further course of action.
