Behaviour change - key to ending road accidents and fatalities

The Gauteng Department of Health (GDoH) has put in place contingency measures to ensure the continuous delivery of healthcare services during the Easter holidays.

Travellers are urged to remain vigilant on the roads, refrain from driving under the influence of alcohol as this reckless behaviour poses a threat to personal safety, and the well-being of fellow road users and further strains the already burdened public healthcare system.

Due to the anticipated increased travel particularly on roads connecting to other provinces and countries, there is a high risk of accidents and trauma related cases as well as the transmission of infectious diseases such as Malaria.

MEC for Health and Wellness, Nomantu Nkomo-Ralehoko has emphasised the importance of abiding by the law to reduce the risk of trauma and emergency-related cases.

"Let us play our part in support of our healthcare professionals who have sacrificed their time to serve us during this busy time of the year. Each one of us bears the responsibility to minimise preventable injuries, road accidents and fatalities," said MEC Nkomo-Ralehoko.

To meet the anticipated demand for healthcare services, the GDoH has implemented contingency plans to ensure adequate staffing levels at public healthcare facilities, along with the allocation of necessary resources and equipment required to provide quality services to the public.

All public hospitals and 38 Community Health Centres (CHCs) offering 24-hour services will remain open to provide medical care to those in need. Additionally, the GDoH has fully resourced the medical supply depot to ensure the availability of medicines and consumables during this period. All four major laundry centres servicing public hospitals across the province will also operate to supply clean linens for in-hospital patients.

In addition, the Gauteng Emergency Medical Services (EMS) is on high alert level to promptly response to emergencies. A fleet of 1358 emergency vehicles, including specialised units such as Armed Violent Incident ambulances, Intensive Care Units (ICU) ambulances, Planned Patient Transport, Special Rescue vehicles, and Primary Response vehicles has been deployed across all five health districts in the province.

The equipment standards have been enhanced with additional neonate and paediatric ventilators to transport low birth weight neonates (babies). EMS personnel have also been strategically deployed to support law enforcement operations in hotspot areas and ensure the safety of residents on the roads and at crowd pulling festivals like the Rand Show.

The EMS Communication Centre has been adequately staffed to handle all incoming calls for emergency. During the December 2023 holidays, 1914 emergency calls were received for accidents, medical emergencies, and trauma cases amongst others.

Throughout the Easter holidays, all 11 Forensic Pathology Service (FPS) centres will remain operational. A total of 72 operational response vehicles, including two disaster response

trucks, have been deployed to provide forensic medical examinations and support victims of crime, including assistance to the police in dealing with drunken-driving incidents.

In light of the active Cholera outbreak in the Southern African Development Community (SADC) countries including Congo, Angola, Ethiopia, Mozambique, Zambia and Zimbabwe, the GDoH wishes to urge travellers to these countries to be cautious and practice good hand hygiene and avoid using contaminated water or water from unknown sources.







Getting your travel vaccines has never been easier!

Are you traveling during this holiday season? Visit one of the Gauteng Department of Health's (GDoH) Travel Clinics to get access to convenient, flexible travel health solutions to keep you safe whilst abroad.

There are five travel clinic clinics across the province of which four are for the public and they include the Bertha Gxowa Hospital, Laudium Community Health Centre, Yusuf Dadoo Hospital, and GDoH Head office at Commissioner Street in Johannesburg.

Those in need of the vaccines as per the requirement of the countries they are visiting can expect to spend an affordable minimum amount of R19.00 to a maximum of R485.60 including the R218.00 consultation fee.

Travellers can get an array of vaccines including Yellow Fever, Menactra, Verorab for rabies, Diftavex for Tetanus and Diphtheria, Heberbiovac for Hepatitis and Typhim for typhoid fever, Doxycline, Malateq and chemoprophylaxis for Malaria, Adacel Quatra for Diphtheria, Tetanus, Polio and Pertussis vaccines. The administration of the vaccines will be administered as per the requirements of the country they are visiting.

It is important that those travelling visit their nearest travel clinic before going to their destination. This is to help them stay safe and protected from diseases found in other parts of the world.

In Gauteng, a large proportion of travellers present with Malaria after visiting endemic areas in and out of the country. These areas include Limpopo and Mpumalanga provinces

and South African Development Community (SADC) countries such as Mozambique, Ethiopia, Nigeria, Zimbabwe, Zambia and Angola.

From January to December 2023, a total of 1 339 Malaria cases which resulted in 15 deaths were reported in the province. Almost 90% of these cases were imported from the SADC countries.

Tebogo Matjokotja, Deputy Director for Communicable Diseases Control said that it was important that travellers report any symptoms of malaria within 21 days of coming back from their trips for malaria rapid test and early treatment.

"When travelling to a malaria endemic area, it is important for people to practice protective measures. People travelling to endemic areas should regularly use of mosquito repellents, wear long trousers and long sleeve shirts, be indoors between dusk and dawn, sleep in airconditioned rooms or in a room with a fan and sleeping in insecticide treated nettings.


"Malaria symptoms include fever, headache, general body aches and pains, general body weakness, nausea, vomiting, loss of appetite, diarrhea and the flu. It is important that people who notice any of these symptoms after visiting a malaria prevalent area visit their nearest clinic or doctor to get tested and treated for malaria, as delay in treatment can lead to death," said Matjokotja.

Beware of tender scams!

It is important for the public to remain vigilant and not fall for tender scams as these are meant to defraud participants of their money.

This warning comes after the Gauteng Department of Health (GDoH) noted the latest scam on WhatsApp where an individual pretending to be the GDoH's Head of Department is asking recipients of a tender-related message to make contact regarding the so-called opportunity.

The public should note that Heads of Departments are not involved in tender administration or directly contacting bidders. GDoH officials are not allowed to



contact any person or company outside the tender processes, especially on WhatsApp or using private domains instead of Gauteng Provincial Government's official domain (Name.Surname@gauteng.gov.za).

The modus operandi of these kind of schemes is that they thrive on giving false hope and on the promise of easy money. Usually, the scammers are counting on the public especially emerging businesses not being able to pick up simple red flags

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such as, a wrong date, the usage of wrong government logos, false contact details, links to fake websites etc.

The commissioning of a new 407 000 litre reservoir at Pholosong Regional Hospital will go a long way in ensuring the facility continues providing uninterrupted services even during water supply interruptions.

The impact of the frequent water outages and intermittent low water pressures in the community of Tsakane, Ekurhuleni has been an ongoing challenge and the hospital being part of the community has not been spared.

Pholosong hospital has experienced multiple water outages since 2022. This affected the facility's ability to provide certain health services, often necessitating diversion and the cancellation of elective procedures and disruption of other essential hospital services.

The step taken by the hospital's management to construct an additional reservoir has ensured sustained water availability for the provision of essential services by the hospital.

"In the month of March for example, there were two reported water interruptions in the area. Our

hospital taps never ran dry since we now have this additional capacity. All water dependant essential services including cooking for patients, sterilisation of theatre equipment, fully functional ablutions and general infection control practises remained uninterrupted," said Acting CEO, Dr Hlomile Mlahleki.



Her foresight and proactive approach ensure that the hospitals are equipped to handle the influx of patients, thanks to the generosity of donors like Mogale.

Beyond the holiday rush, Mogale understands the daily demand for blood in various hospital wards. "Most wards request blood every day, especially in the maternity corridor and patients diagnosed with anemia," she explains. Her firsthand experience as a healthcare worker gives her a unique perspective on the vital role blood donation plays in sustaining life, not just during emergencies, but in routine medical care as well.

Her passion for blood donation extends beyond her own contributions; she actively encourages her community to join her in this noble cause. "I would like to encourage community members to test their blood group and start saving people's lives," she urges. "It's worth it, and it's not painful. Everyone must come." Her words resonate with a sense of urgency and purpose, inspiring others to embrace the opportunity to make a difference.

To further drive participation, she emphasises the importance of education and awareness. "We can encourage people by giving them more information and again to explain the importance of donating blood," she suggests. Through education and advocacy, she seeks to empower others to recognise the power they hold to save lives through a simple act of kindness.

This period of the year has a potential of elevated number of trauma cases, which might require blood transfusion," emphasises Benjamin Mothapi, the Laboratory and Blood Services Coordinator at Dr George Mukhari Academic Hospital. "Therefore, it's important for people to donate blood regularly, as prescribed by South African National Blood Service (SANBS). This will assist in ensuring a safe and sufficient blood supply," he emphasises, highlighting the critical role that regular blood donation plays in meeting the demands of trauma cases during this time of heightened risk.


