## Bertha Gxowa centre for victims of GBV and rape gets an upgrade

Three examination rooms, two counselling rooms, trauma and procedure rooms and showers that are user friendly to persons living with disabilities, these are some of the upgrades the Bertha Gxowa Clinical Forensic Medical Services Care Centre (CFMS) for victims of gender-based-violence and rape has undergone to provide comprehensive services and counselling to survivors.

MEC for Health and Wellness, Nomantu Nkomo-Ralehoko on Friday, 26 April 2024 officially opened the upgraded centre as part of the Gauteng Department of Health's (GDoH) commitment to combatting violence against women and children.

The centre has been a vital resource in the community since its establishment in November 2011 and is now equipped to provide comprehensive healthcare services starting from medical examinations to psychological counselling in a single secure location.

"The goal for renovating this facility was to create a state-of-the-art facility that would cater to the specific needs of survivors of GBV. It is designed to provide inclusive and comprehensive patient management, ensuring that vulnerable populations, including children and people with disabilities, receive the necessary care and support.

"It is our responsibility to provide a safe haven

for survivors and ensure that they receive the care and assistance they deserve, and this renovated facility signifies a new chapter in our collective efforts to support and empower those who have experienced unimaginable trauma," said the MEC.

The facility will now improve access to care for people living with disabilities and will promote privacy and provision of services to patients with dignity. It also has a one-way mirror room which will be used for history taking for children and people utilising sign languages.

The GDoH has 27 designated CFMS facilities across the province with qualified clinicians that provide counselling, medical examinations and treatment, post-exposure prophylaxis and are able to refer victims for psychosocial support and give follow up dates.

In addition, MEC Nkomo-Ralehoko said that the care center also demonstrates the Department's response to President Cyril Ramaphosa's call to intensify efforts in addressing the GBV pandemic.

"We urged all stakeholders and community members to unite in the fight against GBV. We must break the silence surrounding this issue and engage in open and honest conversations about the root causes and consequences of



## Malaria awareness taken to informal settlement communities

Malaria is a life-threatening disease caused by parasites that are transmitted to people through the bites of infected female mosquitoes (Anopheles mosquitoes) which can lead to death if not treated in time. It is most prevalent in most tropical and subtropical areas of the world, with most deaths occurring in Sub-Saharan Africa.

In an effort to ensure that communities are informed about this preventable and curable disease and to mark World Malarial Day (25 April), the Gauteng Department of Health (GDoH) on Friday, 26 April 2024 visited the Jerusalem informal settlement in Boksburg, Ekurhuleni to conduct to advocacy and education on the prevention, treatment and symptoms of Malaria.

Malaria affects over 650 million people annually worldwide with over 2 million people



dying from the disease. In Gauteng, between January and December 2023, a total of 1 339 Malaria cases and 15 deaths were reported.

In order to empower communities with the knowledge to prevent complications that lead to unnecessary deaths posed by Malaria infection, the MEC for Health and Wellness, Nomantu Nkomo-Ralehoko engaged with the community of Jerusalem informal settlement on the prevention, screening and treatment services offered by the GDoH.

"It is high time we turn our attention to the fight against malaria to ensure that our communities, particularly those who travel to endemic provinces and countries in Sub-Saharan Africa countries are empowered to avoid unnecessary

complications and death caused by this infection.

"Prevention remains our strongest weapon in the battle against Malaria. Simple measures such as regular use of mosquito repellents, wearing of long trousers and long sleeve shirts, being indoors between dusk and dawn, sleeping in air-conditioned rooms or in a room with a fan and sleeping in insecticide treated nettings can significantly reduce the risk of infection," said MEC Nkomo-Ralehoko.

The GDoH has five travel clinic clinics across the province which offer Malaria prevention services which include chemoprophylaxis for people who travel to malaria-endemic areas. Four of these are for the public and they include Laudium Community Health Centre, Yusuf Dadoo Hospital, Bertha Gxowa Hospital and the GDoH Head office at Commissioner Street in Johannesburg.

The symptoms of the Malaria disease include fever, headache, general body aches and pains, joint pains, nausea, loss of appetite, vomiting and diarrhoea. Other symptoms may include flu symptoms, especially cough, yellowness of the eyes and dark urine. It is important that people who experience these symptoms after travelling to endemic regions to visit their local clinic to get tested and treated for malaria.

This year, World Malaria Day was observed under the theme "Accelerating the fight against malaria for a more equitable world" as part of efforts to raise awareness about malaria prevention and source funds for treatment of malaria.

## 15 year jail sentence for EMS attacker welcomed

MEC for Health and Wellness, Nomantu Nkomo-Ralehoko has welcomed the conviction of 15 years direct imprisonment handed by the Pretoria Magistrate's Court to a 25-year-old male, Matome Tumi Sepesu on Wednesday, 24 April 2024.

The successful conviction follows a robbery incident which occurred in the Nellmapius area, east of Pretoria in July 2023 where the Gauteng Emergency Medical Services (EMS) crew was hijacked, kidnapped, assaulted and robbed of their personal cell phones and other working tools while responding to what appeared to be a distress call.

Out of four suspects involved in the incident, one has been successfully convicted and sentenced to a 15 years' imprisonment. The other three suspects are still on the run and the police investigation is still underway.

"This conviction sends a strong message to criminals who are targeting healthcare workers when they are discharging their duties trying to save lives of communities. Our teams have been subjected to senseless attacks in some of the communities which have made it rather difficult for them when they have to respond to emergencies," commented Nkomo-Ralehoko.

Meanwhile, the Gauteng EMS suffered two other attacks this week. On Wednesday, 24 April around 10pm in Rieger Park, Ekurhuleni, two suspects robbed paramedics and fled with a PTT radio used for dispatching calls. The incident happened while the crew was responding to a medical call and treating a patient at the back of the ambulance.

The second incident happened at Eersterust in Mamelodi, in the early hours of Thursday morning (25 April) around 01:30am. The crew was also busy treating a patient when the suspect stole a cell phone of one of the paramedics. Fortunately, the suspect was apprehended by the police through the assistance of the community and CPF. The phone was also recovered. The suspect appeared at the Hatfield Branch Court in Pretoria today and was released on bail with the next appearance set for 02 May 2024 at the same

The Gauteng Department of Health continues to plead with communities to play an active role in the protection of healthcare workers and to work with law enforcement agencies to stop continuing attacks on healthcare workers because they have negative impact on the provision of healthcare services.

So, together with his knowledge, skills, and experience, he is believed to be able to serve his community's health needs. As a well-known community leader, Mr. Louw hopes to use his skills to improve the queue management system at the clinic to reduce





patient waiting times and since the winter season is upon us, patients will now be allowed to start entering the clinic at 06:45 for comfort and safety.

"I have decided to be part of the committee because I understand this community and our challenges. I am a good listener and so I pride myself in being able to turn a complaint into a compliment. I achieve all this by engaging with the clinic staff and the

community to understand their needs and concerns," expressed Louw.

Makgai, who has been an advocate for people living with HIV/AIDS in his community was nominated for the stellar work he has been doing between the patients and the clinic. His knowledge and passion stems from living with HIV, while his motivation is rooted in his job as a health advocate at the Treatment Action Campaign (TAC), and his position as the provincial sector representative in the Gauteng Aids Council.

"I want to assist my community greatly by enhancing the trust between the patients and the clinic staff. The 'I Serve With A Smile' initiative will also play an important role in improving the staff's morale and overall attitude towards patients, for a better patient experience of care" said Makgai.


