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EPWP skills development project to empower many

As part of the efforts to accelerate the skilling of participants in the Expanded Public Works Programme (EPWP), the Gauteng Department of Health (GDoH) has launched a skills development initiative in collaboration with various accredited institutions of higher education and training centers.

The initiative is in line with the commitments made by MEC for Health and Wellness, Nomantu Nkomo-Ralehoko, that the Department must ensure that EPWP beneficiaries are provided with the right skills to boost their career progression in the labour market when they exit the programme.

The Department has signed five-year agreements with various skills development providers such as the Tshwane University of Technology, Liberty College of Excellence and TVET Colleges, to accelerate efforts to upskill and re-skill EPWP beneficiaries.

To date, the GDoH has appointed over 4000 EPWP participants across all health facilities and majority of them have already benefitted from this partnership with institutions such as the TVET Colleges, and has led to some securing permanent appointments.

"The EPWP initiative is a key cornerstone in our strategy to build a knowledgeable, skilled, and innovative workforce. We have solidified our partnership with various stakeholders to create a supportive ecosystem that nurtures the ambitions of our participants and connect them to employment opportunities," explained MEC Nkomo-Ralehoko.

Wameemang Marumo (30) is one of the beneficiaries of the EPWP that benefited from the skills development initiative and acquired the necessary education to progress in her career.

"I was afforded the opportunity to be part of the EPWP in 2016 just after I had matriculated. During my period, I have learned several skills in data capturing, records management and I was offered an opportunity to further my studies in Human Resource Management. EPWP was my pathway towards employment, today I am permanently employed at Johannesburg Health District," said Marumo.

The GDoH has also ensured that people who were appointed on contract, such as the COVID-19 data capturers and others, have access to job opportunities within the department.

Makhosazana Zulu was part of the 2021 EPWP cohort and has now been permanently employed in the Department.

The visit was part of continuous efforts by the Gauteng Department of Health to improve access to health services and improve health outcomes of communities through advocacy, screening, prevention and treatment of diseases.

The communities of Piennarspoort received a number of healthcare services including TB and HIV screenings, family planning and contraception, oral health care, podiatry and rehabilitation services amongst others.

In an effort to improve efficiencies and turnaround times when it comes to the collection of deceased bodies, especially during multiple fatality incidents, the Gauteng Department of Health's (GDoH) Forensic Pathology Service (FPS) has unveiled a new fleet of multi-body-carrier vehicles.

These include 11 Sprinter vans which can carry six (6) adult and two (2) infant bodies in a single trip, and seven (7) bakkies that can carry two bodies at a go.

The MEC for Health and Wellness, Nomantu Nkomo-Ralehoko officially handed over the 18 vehicles to Gauteng FPS at a ceremony held at the Diepkloof FPS mortuary in Soweto on Tuesday, 30 April 2024.

MEC Nkomo-Ralehoko said that the new fleet will ensure that the Gauteng FPS is able to respond and provide swift interventions in multiple fatality incidents similar to the unfortunate Boksburg gas tanker explosion and Johannesburg inner city building fire incident which required that resources be redirected to adequately respond to the incidents.

"During such unfortunate and tragic incidents, our response and carrying out of bodies to mortuaries is delayed due to the many trips that have to be taken by the one and two carrier vehicles. We will now be able to move multiple bodies in the shortest period using the newly acquired fleet.

"This is a transformative step forward in our commitment to enhancing the capabilities of our

forensic services. The state-of-the-art vehicles symbolise our dedication to excellence, and our commitment to upholding the highest standards of dignity and respect in our work," said the MEC.

The vehicles are equipped with the latest technology to ensure efficient and dignified management of unnatural deaths and have technological advancements such as cameras, GPS for precise location tracking, enhanced refrigeration systems to better preserve evidence, and more ergonomic designs to ensure the safety and comfort of our personnel such as a hand washing station.

The bakkies are designed to respond to incidents in rough terrain and equipped a winch to pull bodies out of mountainous terrain and locations where the vehicles and personnel are unable to access the scene. These bakkies will be able to respond effectively to similar incidents such as the recent Limpopo bus crash where the deceased bodies had to be carried up the bridge.

In addition, the MEC said that GDoH will continue investing in the Gauteng FPS to ensure the wellbeing of grieving families and dignity of the deceased. The fleet follows the deployment of the Forensic Pathology Fingerprint System which has improved the identification of unidentified deceased bodies and the opening of the Ga-Rankuwa Forensic Pathology Services training centre to train medical doctors, undergraduate doctors, and forensic officers amongst others.

"We will continue to transform our forensic pathology service, ensuring that we not only meet but exceed the expectations of the communities we serve. This commitment to excellence, coupled with our innovative approach, is what will drive us forward, reinforcing our position as leaders in forensic pathology, not just in Gauteng but across the county and in the SADC region," said MEC Nkomo-Ralehoko.

The power of hand hygiene emphasised as a diseases control measure

The Gauteng Department of Health (GDoH) joins the global community in observing World Hand Hygiene Day to raise awareness about the importance of hand hygiene in preventing the spread of diseases.

World Hand Hygiene Day is observed annually on 5 May to improve hand hygiene standards at home and the workplace thereby protecting health and care workers and communities from infections and curbing the spread of harmful germs.

The 2024 theme is "Promoting knowledge and capacity building of health and care workers through innovative and impactful training and education, on infection prevention and control, including hand hygiene".



"It is critical that health and care workers and the public at large make hand hygiene a non-negotiable routine in their daily lives as a simple, yet powerful tool to safeguard their wellbeing. Through advocacy and education we can foster this good habit to prevent the spread of diseases," emphasises Gauteng MEC for Health and Wellness, Nomantu Nkomo-Ralehoko.

Hand hygiene has proven effective as a preventive measure during the COVID-19 pandemic and the recent Cholera outbreak.

It is important to always remember that when practiced properly, hand hygiene can help to prevent the spread of viruses including respiratory and diarrheal infections at home and in public settings. Hands should be washed with a soap or alcohol-based sanitiser for a at least 20 seconds, covering all surfaces of the hands including the palms, back of hands, between fingers, back of fingers, thumbs, finger tips and wrists.

"As we enter the winter months which often sees an increase in cases of flu infections. The message around hand hygiene is even more urgent as a proactive measure to protect ourselves and loved ones to stop the spread of respiratory infections such as influenza," points out MEC Nkomo-Ralehoko.

Furthermore, the GDoH encourages the public, especially those at high risk of severe influenza (adults aged 65 years and older, people with underlying illness such as heart and lung disease and people living with HIV and tuberculosis, as well as pregnant people), to visit their nearest public clinics (on first come-first serve basis) or healthcare providers for flu vaccination. Getting vaccinated is a safe and effective way to protect yourself and those around you from influenza.

In an effort to raise awareness, the GDoH health facilities will embark on a hand washing campaign targeting healthcare workers, patients and the public about the significance of hand hygiene from 5 to 10 May 2024.

Efforts to tackle teenage pregnancy intensified

A multi-sectoral teenage pregnancy intervention plan has been unveiled by the Gauteng Department of Health (GDoH), as part of efforts to intensify the fight against teenage pregnancy.

MEC for Health and Wellness, Nomantu Nkomo-Ralehoko together with multi-sector partners launched the intervention plan on Tuesday, 30 April 2024 at the Lakes Conference Centre in Benoni, Ekurhuleni.

The plan outlines a set of objectives with specific timelines that reflect the commitment to address teenage pregnancy in the province, address factors that lead to teenage pregnancy and promote the health and well-being among adolescents.

It also concentrates efforts on mobilising support and stakeholders from all arms of society including community leaders, youth movements, policy makers, faith-based organisations, business leaders, parents, and school governing bodies to address this challenge in a comprehensive and inclusive manner.

MEC Nkomo-Ralehoko said that the multisectoral plan to tackle teenage pregnancy is a positive step forward in the commitment to respond to the health needs of the adolescents and youth.

"As government, we acknowledge that teenage pregnancy is a societal issue that requires a collective effort. We have partnered with key stakeholders to develop a detailed action plan

with timelines to actively address this challenge in Gauteng," said the MEC.

Overtime, the GDoH has seen an increase in deliveries and termination of pregnancies (TOP) in facilities among girls aged 10 to 19 years old. A total of 24 941 deliveries and TOPs were recorded in facilities across the province during the 2022/23 period and the data shows an increase of 496 cases compared to the 24 445 recorded in the 2021/22 financial year.

Through a transdisciplinary approach and strategic advocacy, the plan seeks to address social behavioural change by providing sexual and reproductive health education and health literacy programmes in communities, especially in schools and higher learning centers to ensure that the targeted adolescents and youth is reached.

The GDoH has also integrated both medical and socio-cultural considerations to ensure a holistic approach to respond to the challenges of teenage pregnancies in an ethical and culturally sensitive manner.

In addition, the intervention plan aims to empower parents, guardian and caregivers, as well as educators and other influential stakeholders to engage in discussions about general child development including sexuality and its dire consequences.

Together with sister departments of Social Development and Education as well as supporting partners, the GDoH will continue to work tirelessly to drive integrated programmes to make a lasting impact on the lives of adolescents and youth in the province.

Qualifying healthcare workers in Gauteng still get commuted overtime

The Gauteng Department of Health (GDoH) has once more reiterated its position on the approval of commuted overtime.

The GDoH previously communicated that it has taken a decision to withdraw the delegation to approve commuted overtime by CEOs of hospitals for the 2024/25 financial year. This means that CEOs will make recommendations for approval by the Head of Department. As a matter of fact, all requests made by the CEOs to the HoD on commuted overtime have been approved.

This decision on withdrawal of delegations was necessitated by challenges over the years related to inconsistencies and inequities in various disciplines on the management and monitoring of the performance of overtime and lack of consequence management. This resulted in irregularities and the department incurring an over expenditure in the commuted overtime budget.

"It is in the interest of improving efficiencies and maximising our limited resources that the Department had to strengthen existing processes and put in place systems and controls that will enhance accountability and

prevent the abuse of the system leading to irregularities in the utilisation of commuted overtime," explains Head of Communication Motalatale Modiba.


The reviewed Commuted Overtime policy and procedures for approvals have been consulted with clinicians and further consultations with other role-players are in progress.

"Furthermore, it is important to note that the Department has filled most of the critical positions such as heads of clinical units, and departments, medical specialists, medical doctors, and nurses which necessitated the

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review of hours of overtime for all clinicians. This is in line with the provisions in the national policy on commuted overtime.

"Contrary to the notion that this will lead to an exodus of doctors from the public service, in Gauteng there has been a growing interest of doctors, especially specialists, who want to work in the province," points out Modiba.



Contractor appointed to provide radiation oncology services

The Gauteng Department of Health (GDoH) on Tuesday, 30 April, announced that it has concluded the tender process to appoint a service provider to render radiation oncology services in line with the Department's standards for comprehensive quality oncology care and the applicable treatment guidelines.

This announcement comes as the GDoH embarks on expanding the provision of radiation oncology healthcare service in Gauteng, with the finalisation of the service offering at its academic hospitals. Currently, radiation oncology services are offered at Charlotte Maxeke Johannesburg



Academic Hospital and Steve Biko Academic Hospital.

The outsourcing of the radiation oncology tender has been finalised for a period of one year and the Department has already commenced with another tender process to ensure that when the current 12 months contract lapses the services

will continue seamlessly as GDoH increases radiation oncology services.

Meanwhile, the Department has committed to respond to the memorandum received on the day form Cancer Alliance, Section27 and Treatment Action Campaign who raised concerns about the provision of radiation oncology services.
