Our department's firm commitment to enhancing the accessibility and quality of cancer screening and treatment services across the province is a testament to our dedication to public health and welfare. This commitment, deeply rooted in our mission to save lives and improve health outcomes, reflects our resolve to confront one of the most challenging health crises of our time. Through focusing on both prevention and treatment, we aim to create a comprehensive healthcare environment that is responsive to the needs of all citizens.

In collaboration with partners like the Pink-Drive and other key stakeholders in both the public and private sectors, we have successfully expanded our service reach. This expansion, crucial in bridging the existing gaps in cancer prevention and care, ensures that more individuals have access to vital health services. The synergy created through these partnerships has not only broadened our capabilities but also enriched our understanding and approach to cancer care.

A major focus of our efforts has been the significant improvement in the availability of cancer screening programs, particularly for breast cancer. Early detection is a critical component in the fight against cancer, and by increasing access to these services, we are actively working to diagnose cancer at stages where it is most treatable.

This proactive approach is not only life-saving but also reduces the long-term burden on our healthcare system. The expansion of these programs is a clear indication of our commitment to proactive healthcare management and our dedication to the wellbeing of our citizens.

Additionally, we have made considerable strides in enhancing cancer treatment services. By integrating the latest medical advancements and therapies, and ensuring they are accessible to a broader segment of the population, we are not just treating cancer but also improving the quality of life for patients and their families. This holistic approach to cancer care is a crucial step towards ensuring that our healthcare services are not only advanced but also compassionate and patient-centered.

So, in our ongoing battle against breast cancer, I want to stress the importance of regular Breast Self-Examinations for all women. This simple practice is crucial for early detection, which can significantly increase the chances of successful treatment. In our province, we are proud to have 10 hospitals equipped with mammogram services, and we're expanding this initiative by adding mammogram outreach services to 15 more hospitals. This effort, in collaboration with Pink Drive, is a crucial part of our strategy to improve breast cancer prevention, with our campaigns set to start on the 8th of February 2024.

For cervical cancer prevention, our focus is on promoting the HPV vaccination for girls aged 9-15 years. We have embraced the latest advancements by transitioning to Liquid-Based Cytology (LBC) for cervical cancer screening, and we're gearing up to

implement HPV screening across the province. This proactive approach is a significant leap forward in our preventive efforts against cervical cancer.

In the area of cervical cancer management and control, our Department has partnered with the Clinton Health Access Initiative (CHAI) to enhance access to treatments for precancerous cervical conditions. This collaboration has led to the donation of 25 LLETZ machines and 7 Colposcopy machines to various health facilities. Consequently, we now have 23 hospitals equipped with LLETZ services, 21 offering Colposcopy, 6 providing Chemotherapy, and 5 capable of administering Radiotherapy.

This expansion of services is more than just a numerical increase; it represents a vital enhancement in the quality of healthcare and the potential for improved outcomes for women facing cervical cancer. By broadening access to these essential services, we are making significant strides in reducing the impact of cervical cancer in our province.

Reflecting on the journey we have embarked upon is crucial. This journey, characterized by both challenges and triumphs, stands as a testament to the power of collaboration and a shared vision. The strides we have made in the field of cancer care are not merely milestones in healthcare advancement; they represent hope for countless individuals and families affected by this disease. The progress we have achieved together serves as a poignant reminder of what is possible when we come together for a common cause.

My heartfelt appreciation goes out to Pink Drive and all our partners, including the many dedicated NGOs, for their commitment to this mission. Their steadfast support and collaborative efforts have been vital in expanding and enhancing the cancer care services we offer across our province.

Their involvement goes beyond just supporting a cause; it is a demonstration of humanity and compassion. Each organization, volunteer, and supporter brings unique strengths and perspectives, collectively contributing to a comprehensive approach to cancer care.
