Banele Mlamla from Duduza in Ekurhuleni is proud to be the first in his family to attend university. The 19-year-old passed matric with five (5) distinctions during the 2024 National Senior Certificate exams and was second top learner at his school, Esibonelwesihle Secondary School in Duduza.

Mlamla, a beneficiary of the foster care program at the Gauteng Department of Social Development, will be heading to the University of the Witwatersrand (WITS) to study for a Bachelor of Science degree in Mechanical Engineering through a bursary from the Gauteng City Region Academy (GCRA).

The bursary is awarded to top achievers from Gauteng schools, top learners from no-fee-paying schools, and the top three (3) learners with Special Education Needs from LSEN schools in Gauteng Province.

Mlamla was raised by his older brother, Nhlanhla Mlamla (33), who later became his foster parent following the death of their mother in 2019, which left them vulnerable and orphaned.

The young and energetic top achiever said his journey to matric was very difficult, as he had to leave friends to focus on his studies. "I want to thank the Gauteng Department of Social Development and my case manager, Makhosazana Mahlangu, for always being there for me. She helped us a lot with our court case, and we managed to receive the foster care grant as my brother was and is still unemployed," said Mlamla.

He further encouraged the matric class of 2025 to remain disciplined. "It is going to be a lot of work in a short space of time, but you need to be disciplined and take your studies seriously. This one year will determine your future," he said.

Social Worker Makhosazana Mahlangu from the Gauteng Department of Social Development's Duduza Office reiterated that Mlamla was always a focused child despite having a tough upbringing.

"As the Department, we wish him well as he begins another stage in his life. We will continue to support him until he turns 21 years old. He must do well and always remember where he comes from," added Mahlangu.
